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

and we're particularly pleased that lots of rubbish (including a couch and a toilet!) were removed from our precious dune area. And a shout out to The Patch crew for doing a great job with their own clean up.

We also appreciate the many people who helped the RSL before, during and after the Dawn Service this year, which was well-attended as always. From sound systems to wreath stands to seating and staging, set-up and pack up, many hands did indeed make light work. Special thanks to our school captains and prefects and to the bugler, Jaden Bridgland, who drove up from Canberra to perform the always moving Last Post and Reveille at the service. And to Surf Club President Tom Tseng who did a lot of the organising and co-ordination.

You may be aware that a **Council election** will (finally) be held on **Saturday 14 September.** The CCA has lodged lengthy submissions with Council regarding several proposed significant zoning and land re-classification changes which could have negative impacts on Copa's character and desirability as a coastal residential environment. We would need local Councillors who could support the principles within those submissions. We have been without proper representation for too long.

At the election, there will be a Referendum which proposes to reduce the number of Councillors and the number of wards in subsequent years. The CCA recommends you vote NO. It is our strong view that we do NOT NEED FEWER local councillors to represent larger geographic areas. Vague arguments of 'cost savings' do not convince us. We need our councillors to strongly represent truly local issues and be accountable to the community.

Please make a diary note that the **CCA AGM will be held on Monday August 19 at 7.30pm** at the Surf Club. A new committee will be voted in at the meeting and we urge all members to renew their memberships before the 8th of July in order to be able to vote for candidates. 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Did you know that there is evidence of an Aboriginal midden that runs along the dunes of Copacabana beach? The dunes are crucial to maintaining the health of our foreshore environment and they require diligent care and management. Copacabana Bushcare was established in 1995 by a group of local volunteers. Over the years the group has received several grants that have enabled us to build the viewing platform and information signs that you see on the Copa foreshores.

You will learn about the importance of the dunes by helping to restore, enhance and protect this fragile coastal environment.
We will teach you about bush regeneration techniques and how to identify the local flora. It's difficult to know what is a weed and what isn't but you'll soon learn the difference. We

also work on seed collection and propagation.

The major focus and achievement of our group over the years has been to preserve and improve the coastal vegetation in the dune area. We aim to stabilise the dunes and improve and restore habitat for native birds and other animals. Without the hard work of our volunteers the native plants would be overrun with weeds. Native vegetation provides protection for our dunes, but the impact of erosion and human interference is becoming increasingly challenging.

We meet on the first Saturday of the month from 2–4pm. No need to register. Just come along and look for our banner opposite the Copacabana shops. Join in for the experience, meet new people, help your local environment...you will be warmly welcomed.

We are always looking for volunteers. If you'd like to do something worthwhile for your local environment but don't have a lot of time, come along to Copacabana Bushcare where you can make a difference among a team of friendly people. Our group meets for two hours once a month, so it's not a big commitment. It's a great way to meet locals, especially if you're new to Copa. No experience is necessary, and all tools are provided.



Sally Bartley

Local Playwright and actor Sally Bartley has been in the news recently for her winning entry, 'Walk a Mile', chosen for performance in the Sage Age Short Play competition in Sydney. She also won the People's Choice Award at the Short and Sweet Sydney Theatre Festival for her play, 'Three Sides to Every Story', after the play won its heat and went into the final.

Sally has lived in Copa for thirty three years, having 'migrated' from Scotland Island when her twin girls were born. The beach was the main attraction – husband Dave is a keen surfer – as well as the relatively affordable real estate (back in the day!). The couple knew people on the coast and loved the lifestyle. Their girls went to Copa Primary and Gosford High. Sally was able to forge creative connections on the Coast, starting with joining the Wyong Drama Group.

When Sally first got involved in theatre, she saw herself behind the scenes rather than up on stage, but she caught the acting bug and since then she has performed in many plays, including at the Red Tree Theatre in Tuggerah (home of the Wyong Drama Group) and Woy Woy Little Theatre. She says that drama has 'really taken off' up here, with theatre goers showing a renewed interest since the Covid years.

Her favourite role was as the Narrator, Jean Louise (the adult Scout) in 'To Kill a Mockingbird', which she found challenging and enjoyable because she was interacting with the audience rather than with other actors as is usually the case.

Sally started writing about eight years ago and wrote her first short play for the Woy Woy Little Theatre 'Flash Festival', which she still enters every year. She has written thirty short plays which run between ten and forty five minutes, but her biggest thrill has been to have her full length play 'Illuminati' put on by Uniting productions in Gosford recently. Sally also performed in the play and says that while it is often difficult for a director to direct an actor who is also the playwright, Ron Baker and Julie Baker did a 'wonderful job' with Illuminati.

Sally has also loved working with her friend, Director Deb Clarke, from Terrigal.

When Sally isn't working, she enjoys walking the local hiking tracks – she did the Camino Trail last year, which she says 'is not for the faint-hearted' with its' cobblestones and rough terrain. Nonetheless, Sally doesn't seem one to shy away from a challenge, as her prodigious creative output suggests. It was a pleasure to talk to Sally and we're lucky to have her and other wonderful creatives here in Copa.

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With Winter cold and rainy weather closing in, you may be planning to venture overseas for a holiday in the next few months.

First step is to go to the government Smart Traveller website for general advice at www.smartraveller.gov.au

On that page you'll see links to various advice regarding your health, including a recommendation that you talk to your doctor regarding specific advice to suit your personal health care needs.

Advice includes:

- Make sure you schedule an appointment with your doctor at least 6 weeks before your departure so that you have ample time to prepare and implement their advice and recommendations.
- Ask if it's safe for you to travel. Especially if you're a mature traveller or have a pre-existing condition. If you rely on specialised care, it may be hard to find overseas.
- If you're planning to travel while pregnant, talk to your obstetrician, travel insurer and airline. They can advise if there's any other steps you can take to reduce risks to you and your unborn child. Tell your doctor where you're going. Ask for preventative advice that suits your needs at your destination.
- · Ask your doctor what vaccinations or boosters you need for your specific destination.
- Ask how many shots (or courses) you'll need, and when to get them. Some vaccinations need several applications and take time to have an effect.
- Find out which infectious diseases are common in your destination. Learn what practical steps you can take to help reduce your risk of infection.
- Find out if you need a vaccination certificate to enter your destination. This is especially common in countries with Yellow Fever.
- Some preventative products like mosquito nets you can probably get when you get there. Others, especially repellents and medications, may be safer to buy before you go. Not all destinations share Australia's high quality and safety standards.

- Stock up on medications and supplies. You may have challenges refilling your script or finding medical supplies overseas. Your medication may not be available at your destination; it could be low quality or even illegal there.
- · Ideally, take enough medication for your whole trip. You may wish to take a bit extra, in case things change and your return home is delayed.
- Find out if your prescription medication is legal in your destination. Local authorities could charge you for carrying or using drugs. You could be arrested or jailed.
- · Find out if the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) has restrictions on your medication. There are laws and restrictions on the amount and types of PBS subsidised medicine you can take overseas.
- Keep your medication in the original packaging. Carry your script and a letter from your doctor that explains why you have it. If authorities question you about your medication, this can help prove it's for personal use, not for sale.
- When you're packing, keep some of your medication in different bags. If one bag is lost or stolen, you won't have to worry about running out.


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We experienced a relatively slow start to autumn this year due to the wet weather, which delayed our usual hazard reduction burns. On a positive note, our recent recruitment campaign was a success. We welcomed two new trainees who are about to complete their assessments in the coming weeks. Once they pass these assessments, they will be fully qualified to respond to emergency calls in the community. Their addition to our team will bolster our response capabilities and help us serve you better.

We encourage everyone to follow our Facebook page for updates, including details about our second recruitment drive later this year. If you are interested in joining our dedicated team, this will be a great opportunity to get involved.

As we transition into winter, the risk of house fires increases. This is a critical time to ensure your home and family are prepared. If there is a fire in your home, do not wait—EVERY SECOND COUNTS. GET OUT and STAY OUT, then call triple zero (000). It is imperative that you never re-enter a burning building under any circumstances. Your safety is our top priority.

Creating a home escape plan and ensuring you have working smoke alarms can significantly increase your chances of escaping a fire safely. Tragically, nearly 50% of homes in NSW damaged by fire do not have working smoke alarms. Fire and Rescue NSW strongly recommends installing hard-wired, interconnected smoke alarms, as they provide the best protection. If this isn't feasible, smoke alarms with 10-year lithium batteries are a good alternative.

Maintaining your smoke alarms is just as important as having them. Test your smoke alarms monthly by pressing and holding the button for 5 seconds until you hear the beeps. Every six months, vacuum dust off your smoke alarms to keep them free of particles and reduce the likelihood of false alarms. Annually, replace any lead or alkaline batteries, and replace your smoke alarms every 10 years, or sooner if specified by the manufacturer. These small steps can make a big difference in ensuring your safety.

We are excited to announce that we will be hosting an open day at our station on June 22nd for the 5 Lands Walk.. This event is a fantastic opportunity for the community to come together and learn more about fire safety. We will have our trucks on display, and our team will be available to answer any questions you might have. And don't miss out on our homemade cake stall, featuring all your favourites. We look forward to seeing you there and sharing a great day with you. Thank you for your continued support and cooperation. Together, we can make our community safer.
